Learn from Phil John — a very special friend of Ready Raccoon

Phil A. John (aka "Ready") created our mascot, Wildfire Ready Raccoon, in the wake of the 2008 fires that

threatened many of Butte County's communities. Over the course of the 30 years that Phil called Paradise home, he found creative ways to motivate our communities' residents to be prepared for wildfire by maintaining defensible space, hardening buildings and knowing evacuation strategies.

Phil frequently advocated for wildfire safety by speaking to community groups, attending events, presenting at schools and marching in local parades as the "Wildfire Ready Raccoon." In addition, Phil volunteered through the Town of Paradise's Emergency Operations and also served on the Paradise Ridge Fire Safe Council for over a decade.

With the one-year anniversary of the Camp Fire, we still see our communities in a process of trying to recover and move forward. We also see a renewed wildfire awareness in Butte County residents—as well as the within Californians who live in the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI).

The Butte County Fire Safe Council (BCFSC) was not immune to the effects of the fire. Four of our five staff members lost their homes and were forced to relocate. BCFSC's office narrowly escaped the flames but suffered extensive smoke dam-COUNCI age.

With growth, however, comes growing pains. We are a creative, adaptable and mindful team that is trying new and innovative ways to continue the work we



have always done while adding new facets to this new world we face. This includes tree removal assistance and extending our Chipper Program in the Camp Fire footprint to participating in numerous exciting collaboratives to assist and rebuild our communities.
